



### Directions

**Subway:** Take the 2 or 3 to Eastern Parkway/Brooklyn Museum. Transfers to the 2 and 3 are available from the 4 and 5 (at Nevins Street) and the B, D, Q, N, R, and LIRR (at Atlantic Avenue/Pacific Street).

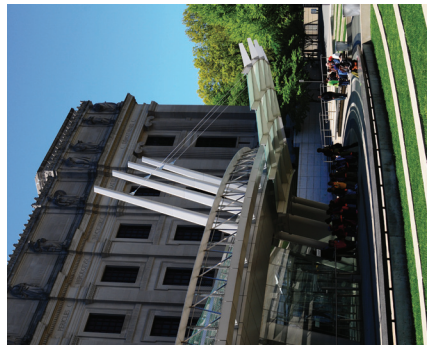
**Bus:** Take the B41 or B69 to Grand Army Plaza and walk east along Eastern Parkway.

**Car:** From Manhattan, take the Brooklyn Bridge left onto Tillary Street, right onto Flatbush Avenue to Grand Army Plaza to Eastern Parkway. Turn right on Washington Avenue. An attended parking lot is directly behind the Museum.

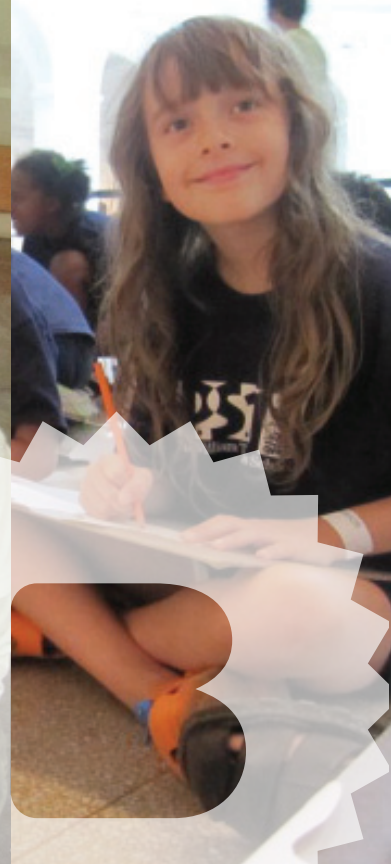
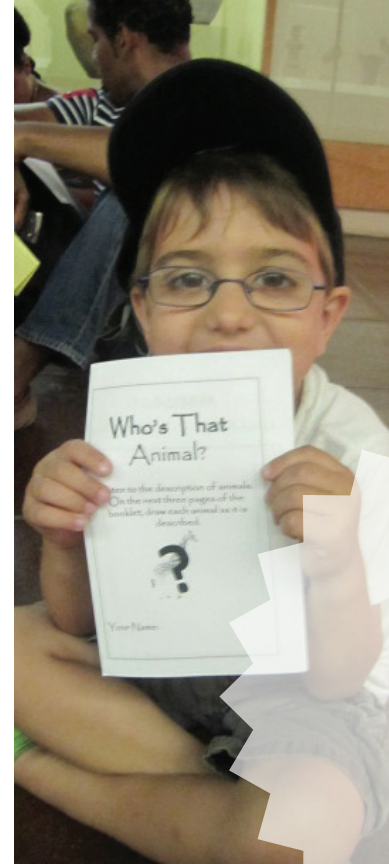

## Day Camp Group Tours Summer 2011



Bring your day camp group to the Brooklyn Museum this summer for an exciting cross-cultural journey through art. Campers will learn how to look at artworks from around the world through fun, thought-provoking, interactive guided tours that include activities such as storytelling, drawing, and observation.

All tours draw from one or more of the following collections: Asian Art, Islamic Art, African Art, Ancient Egyptian Art, American Art, and European Art.



Choose one of the following tours, for groups with children ages five to twelve:

- People in Art
- New York City, Past and Present
- On the Wild Side
- The Artist's Environment
- Powerful and Royal Leaders
- Goddesses and Gods

### General Information

Day camp group tours are available Wednesday through Friday, July 13 to August 19. Camp groups may sign up for either guided or self-guided tours. Guided tours are available at 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Self-guided tours take place at 11:30 a.m. All camp groups must have a reservation. Each guided tour may include no more than twenty-five campers.

The fee for both guided and self-guided tours is \$3 per camper, to be paid in full no later than one week in advance. The first five chaperones (campers and counselors over fourteen) are admitted free. The fee for each additional chaperone is \$5 per chaperone. We ask that your chaperone staff assist us in maintaining proper Museum protocol during the tour.



### Reservations

To make a reservation, call (718) 501-6221 or e-mail [youth.tour@brooklynmuseum.org](mailto:youth.tour@brooklynmuseum.org). When leaving or sending a message, include the following information:

- Your name.
- The name and address of your organization.
- Your phone number and the best time of day to reach you.
- The number of campers.
- The age range of the campers.
- At least two dates you are available for a tour.
- Your choice between the guided and self-guided options. If you choose guided, state which tour you would prefer: People in Art, New York City, Past and Present, Mythic Beasts, The Artist's Environment, Powerful and Royal Leaders, or Goddesses and Gods.

- The tour time you prefer: 11 a.m. or 1:30 p.m. (guided) or 11:30 a.m. (self-guided).
- Any adaptations for special needs, learning styles, or language considerations. Your reservation is not complete until you receive a letter of confirmation with the exact time and date of your visit. Unscheduled groups will not be admitted.

To cancel or reschedule your visit, call (718) 501-6221 as soon as you know you are unable to keep the reservation. You must call no later than a week before your scheduled arrival date to avoid being charged for your reservation.



### Museum Apprentice Program

Participants in the Museum Apprentice Program provide the guided gallery tours for summer day camp groups. Museum Apprentices are high-school students who have been trained by museum educators and curators to teach children about art using the Museum's collections. The Apprentices work in teams to develop lessons that are fun-filled, educational, and age-appropriate.
